# **NEWS**

**UK** – BPAS' new report, entitled <u>Contraception</u>, <u>Re-imagined</u>: <u>The Unfinished Revolution</u>, is based on a survey of 1,000 women and people needing contraception in the U.K. aged 18-45 years, as well as analysis of public health datasets. It looks at women's past and present contraceptive experiences, as well as their future preferences, with a particular focus on the need for urgent contraceptive innovation. The report highlights ongoing barriers to access to existing contraception and women's apparent turn away from hormonal contraception and shows the appetite for change-specifically the high demand for long-acting reversible contraception for men, as well as new methods of fertility control for women, known as contragestives.

Deaths have outnumbered births annually in the UK for the first time in nearly 50 years, excluding the Covid pandemic, new official figures show. There were 16,300 more deaths than births in the year to June 2023, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) said. <u>BBC News</u> and <u>Sky News</u> report.

**USA** – A new bill introduced in the US would lower the marriage age in nearly half the United States and potentially legalise the trafficking of minors to the U.S. under the guise of marriage. The federal bill is named the <u>Child Marriage Prevention Act</u> and is intended to combat child marriage, but some provisions in the bill actually would contradict the national and global commitment to end child marriage by the end of the decade. Instead of setting a minimum age of 18 for spousal visas it would set a minimum age of 16 for minors around the world to receive a spousal visa to the U.S. <u>Ms Magazine</u> reports.

An article by <u>The Fuller Project</u>, in collaboration with Ms Magazine examines the implications of a second Trump presidency for women, both in the US and globally.

This week Melinda French Gates launched Action for Women's Health, a \$250 million open call for organisations focused on improving the mental and physical health of women. "Women's health continues to be an afterthought and it's impacting the health of our families, our communities, our economies," said French Gates in a video accompanying the announcement. "Thankfully, there are so many organizations around the world working to change that.". Devex and CNN report.

**Nepal** – <u>The Telegraph</u> reports that more and more women in Nepal are suffering iatrogenic fistula, a condition caused by surgical errors. In 2013, just 11 per cent of patients treated for fistula at the B.P. Koirala Institute of Health Sciences had iatrogenic fistula. By 2018, this figure had jumped to 51 per cent, a proportion which has remained roughly the same since.

International Day of the Girl Statement – Dr. Natalia Kanem, Executive Director of UNFPA, released a statement on Friday 11 October, for the International Day of the Girl 'Adolescent girls have a vision for a better future: Let's stand with them, and not in their way', which can be read online here.

**UNICEF Study on Sexual Violence** – More than 370 million women and girls across the world were raped or sexually assaulted before they turned 18, according to the first global estimates tracking sexual violence in childhood. The analysis, published on Thursday by UNICEF, also warned that a boom in new technology and social media is "changing the landscape" and driving a new wave of sexual violence. Reuters and The Daily Mail report.

**Intimate Partner Violence** - Intimate partner violence (IPV) is common worldwide. The risk factors for IPV include several that are related to reproductive health such as pregnancy, infertility and reproductive coercion. Infertility professionals would benefit from education and training in IPV to enable them to better identify and assist patients who are victims of IPV. This observation is supported by studies such as <a href="this,">this,</a> conducted in the USA.
