FOREWORD



As the chair of the UK All-Party Parliamentary Group on Population, Development and Reproductive Health (the Group) and President of the European Parliamentary Forum on Population and Development, I am pleased to report that the Group has had yet another active and successful year.

Thanks to continued pressure from the Group, the UK Government is increasing its political and financial support to family planning and sexual and reproductive health and rights.

Of particular importance this year has been the International Conference on Population and Development review process and progress with the post-2015 development framework. The Group has been involved in both processes to shape the global population and development agenda through parliamentary debates, conferences, meetings with Ministers and civil servants and letter writing.

The UK Government's support for a gender goal and a target on universal access to sexual and reproductive health and rights within the post-2015 development framework has been explicit in all fora, as has its support for further improving access to abortion services following rape in war zones.

Other highlights this year has been progress in connection with the Group's hearings on child marriage and female genital mutilation. Forced Marriage became a criminal offence in June 2014 and the first UK prosecutions for female genital mutilation were announced by the Crown Prosecution Service (CPS) in March 2014. The UK International Development (Gender Equality) Bill became an Act of Parliament in March 2014 and stipulates that the Secretary of State for International Development has to consider the impact of the UK's Official Development Budget (about £7billion annually) on gender equality.

Five Parliamentarians have joined the Group this year following a study tour to Myanmar and briefing meetings.

In 2014/15 the Group will continue to recruit new members and scrutinise, monitor and hold the UK Government accountable to its political and financial commitments via conferences, meetings, letter writing, parliamentary questions and debates, and media activities.

NEW GROUP MEMBERS (APRIL 2013 - MARCH 2014)

The Group continues to engage and recruit new parliamentarians via briefing meetings, report launches, press activities, receptions, conferences and study tours.

Select members whom had spoken on family planning (FP) and sexual and reproductive health and rights (SRHR) in Parliament this year were contacted for briefing meetings in collaboration with Women and Children First (UK). This included:

Damian Hinds MP, Rehman Christi MP, Zac Goldsmith MP, Fiona O' Donnell MP, Carole Dinenage MP, Stephen O'Brien MP, Seema Malhotra MP, Richard Benyon MP, Laura Sandys MP and Amber Rudd MP.

Communications followed with Carole Dinenage MP, Damien Hinds MP and Stephen O'Brien MP. Stephen O'Brien MP subsequently joined the Group.

In November 2013 letters were sent to Myanmar study tour delegates, inquiring about their interest in becoming active members. John Mann MP, Meg Munn MP and Craig Whittaker MP all agreed to join the Group.

Current members have also sensitised colleagues, which resulted in Baroness Hodgson joining the Group in May 2013.

New Group Members John Mann MP (L)

John Mann MP was elected as Labour MP for Bassetlaw in June 2001. He has run high profile campaigns on consumer debt, heroin and treatment for addiction. In 2003 he ran a successful campaign to keep Bassetlaw Hospital 'Accident and Emergencies' department open and in 2006 he won the campaign to stop Bassetlaw Primary Care Trust from being merged into a wider countywide primary care trust. John Mann MP sits on the influential Treasury Committee and previously served as Parliamentary Private Secretary to Minister for the Olympics Tessa Jowell MP, and for Richard Caborn MP, then Minister for Sport. He is a former Chairman of Labour Students.

Meg Munn MP (L)

Meg Munn MP was elected in 2001 as Labour MP for Sheffield Heeley constituency. She was Minister for Women and Equality (2005-2007), then Foreign Office Minister until October 2008. Since 2008 she has been Chair of the Kurdish Region in Iraq All-Party Parliamentary Group (APPG) and has visited the region a number of times, including leading the UK Trade & Investment and Middle East Association trade delegation to the Erbil International Trade Fair

in October 2011. Meg Munn MP has led numerous training/mentoring sessions and is currently engaged in a long-term project supporting development in the Iraqi Parliament. She was Chair of the Westminster Foundation for Democracy (2008-2010), and Vice-Chair (2010-2012).

Stephen O'Brien MP (C)

Stephen O'Brien MP was elected as a Conservative MP for Eddisbury in a 1999 by-election. He has held several important roles while an MP including Parliamentary Under-Secretary of State (PUSS) for International Development (ID) (2010-2012) and Shadow Minister for Health (2005-2010). Stephen O'Brien MP has held the position of Chairman in APPGs on Malaria, and on Tanzania, and served as Vice-Chairman of the All-Party Aid Trade and Debt Group.

Craig Whittaker (C)

Craig Whittaker MP was elected Conservative MP for Calder Valley at the 2010 General Elections. He serves on the Education Select Committee and has a special interest in enhancing the educational achievements of looked after children and is Chairman of a local charity called TLC (Together for Looked-After Children). He is also the Chairman of the APPG on 'Looked after Children & Care Leavers,' Chairman of the APPG on 'Adoption and Fostering' and Co-Chairman of the APPG on Street Children.

Baroness Hodgson (C)

Baroness Hodgson of Abinger became a Conservative peer in 2013. She is a former President of the Conservative Women's Association and Board Member of the Conservative Party. Baroness Hodgson has campaigned extensively on issues relating to gender equality and women and security, with a specific interest in conflict settings. She has visited Rwanda and took part in the 2008 UN Commission on the Status of Women (CSW), and is vice-Chair in the UK APPG on Women, Peace and Security.

This year the Group advertised for a new part-time researcher/administrator as Katharine Dow moved to a full-time university research position. The Group received 300 applications and five were short-listed for interview. Benjamin Hunter was successful and joined the Group in January 2014.

GROUP AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

Aims

To ensure the full implementation of the International Conference on Population and Development (ICPD) Programme of Action (PoA) with specific reference to stabilising the world's population through ensuring choice and sustainable development

Objectives

- To raise the profile of population, and SRHR including FP in Parliament and internationally;
- To provide parliamentary backing to the Secretary of State for International Development (SS for ID) in their negotiations with the Treasury with a view to increasing the UK Official Development Assistance (ODA) to 0.7% of Gross National Income (GNI), with 10% allocated to the ICPD PoA;
- To keep under review population trends and SRHR programmes/policies/legislation nationally and internationally;
- In consultation with government departments, international agencies and non-governmental organisations (NGOs), to assess how the UK might respond to requests from outside for support and to press for action by Parliament and the Government;
- To study the results of research into the causes and consequences of population changes and the effect that access to comprehensive SRHR services has on population and draw these to the attention of both Houses of Parliament;
- To increase awareness of the interdependence between countries, with reference to poverty reduction, women's equality, access to SRHR services, environment, consumption and pollution and the impact of legislation, policies and practices of one country upon others.

Group Parliamentary Briefing Meetings

This year, 17 Parliamentary briefing meetings/receptions were co-organised by the Group, where members were briefed on topical population, reproductive and maternal health, FP and international development (ID) issues in support of their parliamentary advocacy.

Joint APPG on International Development briefing meeting: Parliamentarians Ending Poverty – "The Future of International Development: 2015 and Beyond, 24th April, House of Commons (HoC), London

The Group in collaboration with 21 APPGs hosted the above event. Keynote speakers included Justine Greening MP, SS for ID; H.E. Mr Wesley Johnson, Liberian Ambassador to the UK and Sir Richard Jolly, Honorary Professor at the Institute of Development Studies and Former Assistant Secretary General of the UN.

At the meeting Justine Greening MP outlined the UK's vision for the future of international development and the framework required to support it; Mr Johnson discussed the impact of the Millennium Development Goals (MDG) in his country and shared his priorities for the future framework; and Sir Richard Jolly gave his perspectives on the lessons learnt during the original UN MDG process.

Several group members attend the event and raised questions on FP and the new MDG Framework.

Joint Group, APPG Global Health, London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine (LSHTM), Women and Children First (UK) and University College London report launch: Reducing maternal mortality via community groups, 20th May 2013, HoC, London

This reception was organised to launch new LSHTM and Women and Children First (UK) research findings on saving mothers' lives. Findings were presented from Bangladesh, India, Malawi, and Nepal, which all showed that supporting women's groups had significantly reduced maternal deaths.

International Centre for Research on Women briefing meeting, 5th June 2013, House of Lords (HoL), London

The Group met with Ravi Verma, International Centre for Research on Women (ICRW) regional director for the Asia Region and Sarah Degnan Kambou, President of ICRW, for an introduction to the organisations work and its current projects and possible areas for collaboration. The Group's Hearings on child marriage and funding opportunities were also discussed.

ICRW is a global NGO conducting policy and programme research on social and economic issues hindering the advancement of women and girls living in marginalised communities across the globe. The organisation has its headquarters in Washington DC and regional offices in Delhi, India and Nairobi, Kenya and receives funding from the Department for International Development (DFID). In the UK, the organisation works with several other NGOs including Girls Not Brides and the Cherie Blair Foundation for Women. In June 2013 they co-hosted a public discussion on violence against women and girls at the Royal Society with Girls-Not-Brides.

Joint Group, International Planned Parenthood Federation (IPPF) and LSHTM World Population Day meeting and reception, 10th July 2013, HoL, London Above events were hosted to bring attention to this year's World Population Day.

An afternoon technical briefing and panel discussion was held under the World Population Day theme: Healthy lives: Young women, rights and pregnancy.

Julia Bunting, Director, Programmes and Technical Division, IPPF moderated the event with the following three speakers: Jane Edmondson, Deputy Director, Policy Division, Human Development Department, DFID; Valerie DeFillipo, Director of Family Planning 2020 Global Partnership on FP2020 and Dr Nonhlanhla Dlamini, National Director for Adolescent Health, Republic of South Africa. Jane Edmondson presented the UK Government's commitment to adolescent girls and Valerie DeFilllipo presented progress made since the FP2020 launch one year earlier, whilst Dr Nonhlanhla Dlamini outlined adolescent pregnancies around the world, the geography, the history and the changing future.

A panel and general discussion followed on the themes:

- Adolescent pregnancies has the UK finally reversed the rise and what may have contributed? Professor Kaye Wellings, LSHTM;
- Why is the UN now focusing more on adolescents? What are the priorities in UNICEF? Susan Kasedde, UNICEF lead for adolescent health;
- What have we learned about reaching adolescents with reproductive health services, and what works? Dr Deepmala Mahla, Marie Stopes International (MSI); and
- The Lancet has initiated a Commission on Adolescent Health what difference will this make? Professor David Ross, LSHTM

The event was attended by government officials, academics, embassy representatives and NGOs.

At the World Population Day evening reception key note speakers included: Lord Ahmad, DFID's spokesperson in the HoL, Peter Piot, Director at LSHTM, and

Tewodros Melesse, Director General at IPPF. Speakers outlined their contribution to adolescents SRHR around the world.

The reception was attended by embassy representatives, MPs, NGOs and academics. Networking followed the speeches.

Joint media activity was instigated on the day with operational editorials disseminated by the Group, LSHTM and IPPF. Two articles were published in the Huffington Post and IPPF achieved coverage in Euractive.

Reckitt Benckiser meeting on FP and corporate responsibility, 15th July and 16th December 2013, HoL, London

The Group had on numerous occasions contacted Myriad to set up a meeting between the Group and their corporate responsibility representative to discuss FP, but without success. In July 2013, the Group finally managed to set up a meeting with Dr Cathal Coyle, Reckitt Benckiser Medical Marketing Manager – the person now in charge of marketing Durex.

At the meeting Dr Cathal Coyle presented Reckitt Benckiser marketing strategy in the UK, dissemination networks and UK condom research findings.

He recommended Baroness Tonge meet with Charles Shepherd, Durex Global Professional Relations Manager to discuss international dissemination strategies and corporate responsibility. This meeting took place in December 2013.

At the meeting it became apparent that Reckitt Benckiser works closely with certain country Ministries on the dissemination of medical supplies, however no work had been undertaken with DFID in connection with FP dissemination. Charles Shepherd agreed to contact relevant staff within DFID after the Group initiating discussions.

Joint Group and 'Made in Europe' DFID project report launch, 8th October 2013, HoC, London

The Group met with Saif Ahmad, Chief Executive Officer, and Sarah Javid, Director of Operations, for a briefing meeting on 'Made in Europe' upon their request in June 2013. The NGO outlined their work and its DFID funded project on mobilising Muslim communities and NGOs to support global maternal health in line with MDG5.

The research conducted at the start of the project identified that despite the fact that a large percentage of maternal deaths take place in Muslim-majority countries, the response by UK-based Muslim development NGOs to date had been extremely limited. Only 35% worked on maternal health with almost an exclusive focus on infrastructure and service delivery, while vital issues such as FP, female genital mutilation (FGM) and early marriage were not addressed.

The 'Made in Europe' campaign aimed to address some of the barriers preventing an increase in maternal health programming by Muslim development NGOs, such as a lack of expertise among staff, limited supporter awareness about maternal health and the reputational risk to NGOs of challenging traditional attitudes to maternal health.

It was agreed at the meeting, that the Group would help launch their end of project findings in October 2013 with the title: "At Our Mothers' Feet project: Mobilising Muslim communities to campaign on global maternal health".

According to the organisation this is the first campaign of its kind in the Muslim sector and had achieved some significant progress:

- 12 Muslim NGOs pledged to start or increase work on global maternal health, of which seven have already started to implement new projects;
- One Muslim NGO formed a partnership with the White Ribbon Alliance with whom they are working in Pakistan;
- Over 30 events had taken place with Muslim communities around the UK including khutbhas (sermons) at mosques, workshops and school lessons;
- The project has been endorsed by over 50 high profile religious and community leaders in the UK;
- Over 60 pieces of media coverage have been secured in ethnic/faith-based media; and
- A song had been developed to promote the campaign in partnership with The Sound of Reason - http://www.youtube.com/watch?v=CVGm7sFAAAc

Joint Group, APPG on Bangladesh and MSI round table event: The Right to Health: making rights and accountability a reality, 15th October 2013, HoC, London

Above round table event was organised to present and discuss practical solutions for tackling poverty, inequality and addressing the barriers to health care, with a particular focus on reproductive health in Bangladesh, Somaliland, India and the UK. MSI shared lessons from a project, supported by DFID/UK Aid that had transformed access to maternal health in one of the most remote regions of Bangladesh. Health Poverty Action, IPPF and INVOLVE shared case studies from Somaliland, India and the UK illustrating how active public involvement can strengthen health systems and accountability.

Joint Group, APPG Global Health and Action for Global Health panel discussion: The Health Worker Crises: an analysis of the issues and main international responses, 28th October 2013, HoL, London

Sarah Edwards, Head of Policy and Campaigns, Health Poverty Action introduced their 'Health Workers for All project'; Victoria Kimotho, African Medical and Research Foundation presented the scale of the problem and why health workers are so important, with a focus on the health of women and girls; David McCoy, University College London and People's Health Movement, presented the UK's responsibility for tackling the Human Resources for Health crises and what opportunities the 3rd Global Forum could offer; Janet Davies, Royal College of Nursing (RCN) presented the UK perspective – domestic challenges and their potential impact on the global health workforce and Lynne Featherstone MP, PUSS responded to presentations and messages.

Joint Group and APPG Sexual and Reproductive Health meeting with China National Commission of Health and FP delegation, 13th January 2014, HoC, London

Xiaoyu Song, Project Manager of Sino-Bridge International (a subsidiary of a parent company based in Beijing, People's Republic of China, which facilitates exchange visits between the UK and China) contacted the Group, requesting a meeting. This was set up with the 25 Chinese delegates led by Ms Nan Chunmei, the Inspector of Personal Department, National Health and Family Planning Commission of China, to present and discuss parliamentary advocacy and UK policies on population, development and sexual health.

Global Justice Centre meeting, 17th December 2013, HoC, London

Chatham House briefing meeting on abortion in conflict affected states, 29th January 2014, HoC, London

The Group met with Louise Arimatsu and Hannah Bryce from the Royal Institute of International Affairs, Chatham House to discuss access to safe abortion services in conflict zones, with particular reference to access to services and national verses international law.

It became apparent during the briefing meeting that there are different interpretations of the legality of abortion services after rape in war zones.

Maternity Action and Royal College of Midwives (RCM) meeting on UK Immigration Bill and Maternity care, 12th February 2014, HoC, London

The Group met with Sarah LaPham, Maternity Action, and Simon Popay, RCM, to discuss the impact of the new UK Immigration Bill on maternity care of vulnerable migrant women across the UK. The Bill proposed by the UK Government altered for the UK National Health Service (NHS), which included care for pregnant women. Their briefing concluded that current NHS charging arrangements already make it difficult for vulnerable migrant women to obtain essential maternity care, despite them having significantly worse maternal and infant health than the rest of the population. National Institute for Clinical Excellence (NICE) guidance also acknowledged the poor health outcomes for this group of women and recommend measures are taken to promote early engagement with maternity services.

The additional costs associated with delayed access to antenatal care were outlined at the briefing.

Baroness Cumberlege had agreed to table an amendment in support of free services for pregnant immigrants and Baroness Jenny Tonge supported the amendment.

During committee stage the amendment was unfortunately withdrawn along with similar amendments.

RCOG and RCM meeting on lower segment caesarean section verses spontaneous vaginal delivery in the UK and abroad, 20th March 2014, HoC, London

The World Health Organization (WHO) recommends that the caesarean section rate should not be higher than 10 - 15% to ensure the best outcome for mothers and their babies. In the UK however around 25% of babies are now delivered via lower segment caesarean section. In the developing world the caesarean section rate is around 14%.

This briefing session by Professor James Walker, University of Leeds and past Senior Vice-President of the RCOG, Global and Public Health, and Louise Silverton, Director of Midwifery, RCM provided members with information regarding the financial and health costs and benefits between caesarean sections and spontaneous vaginal delivery. Of particular interest at this meeting was also a paper circulated on the intra-partum effects on the neonatal health outcomes including later allergies in connection with lower segment caesarean section.

Jane Ellison MP, RCOG, RCM, RCN FGM reception, 4th November 2013, HoC, London

Members attended above reception where the inter-collegiate recommendations for identifying, recording and reporting FGM were launched.

Top inter-collegiate recommendations for tackling FGM in the UK were:

- Treat it as Child Abuse: FGM is a severe form of violence against women and girls. It is child abuse and must be integrated into all UK child safeguarding procedures in a systematic way;
- Document and collect information: The NHS should document and collect information on FGM and its associated complications in a consistent and rigorous way;
- Share that information systematically: The NHS should develop protocols for sharing information about girls at risk of or girls who have already undergone FGM with other health and social care agencies, the Department for Education and the police;
- Empower frontline professionals: Develop the competence, knowledge and awareness of frontline health professionals to ensure prevention and protection of girls at risk of FGM. Also ensure that health professionals know how to provide quality care for girls and women who suffer complications of FGM;
- Identify girls at risk and refer them as part of child safeguarding obligation: Health professionals should identify girls at risk of FGM as early as possible. All suspected cases should be referred as part of existing child safeguarding obligations. Sustained information and support should be given to families to protect girls at risk;
- Report cases of FGM: All girls and women presenting with FGM within the NHS must be considered as potential victims of crime, and should be referred to the police and support services:
- Hold frontline professionals accountable: The NHS and local authorities should systematically measure the performance of frontline health professionals against agreed standards for addressing FGM and publish outcomes to monitor the progress of implementing these recommendations;
- Empower and support affected girls and young women (both those at risk and survivors):
 This should be a priority public health consideration; health and education professionals
 should work together to integrate FGM into prevention messages (especially those focused
 on avoiding harm, e.g. National Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Children (NSPCC)
 'Pants' Campaign, Personal, Social and Health Education, extracurricular activities for young
 people); and
- Implement awareness campaign: The government should implement a national public health and legal awareness publicity campaign on FGM, similar to previous domestic abuse and HIV campaigns.

European Meetings

European Parliamentary Forum on Population and Development (EPF)

Collaboration between the Group and EPF (and its other member organisations), as well as other regional parliamentary networks, continues to be strong. Parliamentary advocacy activities have been shared on-line, discussed over the phone and at meetings.

Of particular interest this year has been the collaboration around the G8 Parliamentary conference co-hosted in May 2013 in London, which saw 57 parliamentarians from 34 countries around the world agree upon a powerful message to the policymakers who are planning the future framework for International Development (please see Conference section for further information).

At the EPF's executive meeting in May 2013 Baroness Jenny Tonge was elected President. She attended its council meeting in Brussels in October 2013 and has since then spoken at numerous meetings and conferences in Europe, Asia and Africa (please see Conference section for further information).

Numerous EPF campaign letters and briefings have been shared and sent this year to UK Council of Europe members and Members of the European Parliament (MEP). In April 2013 briefings were circulated to UK Council of Europe MPs regarding Mr Volonte's Council of Europe drafted resolution: 'Violence against religious communities'. This resulted in over 24 progressive amendments being presented and the heavily improved report was adopted by a large majority of the Council of Europe Assembly.

Campaign letters have been sent in support of three other Council of Europe resolutions, which were presented this year on SRHR: Resolution 1945 (2013):

'Putting an end to coerced sterilisations and castrations'; resolution 1948 (2013): 'Tackling discrimination on the grounds of sexual orientation and gender identity' and "Stepping up action against global inequalities: 'The World Beyond 2015 - Europe's contribution to the MDGs process". The first two reports have been adopted.

In the beginning of 2014 campaign letters were disseminated to supportive MPs in 36 parliaments across Europe urging them to support the signature and ratification of the Council of Europe's Istanbul Convention on preventing and combating violence against women and domestic violence. Three years after its opening for signature in Istanbul, the Convention is entered into force on 1st August 2014. To date, 14 member states of the Council of Europe have ratified this new human rights treaty and another 22 states have signed it.

A campaign letter with EPF support was sent to the El Salvador President in May 2013 regarding Beatriz (a pseudonym) who was in need of a life-saving therapeutic abortion. An abortion was finally granted due to global pressure and a court decision on 30th May 2013.

In June 2013 a campaign letter was sent to the Macedonian Ambassador in London on the Macedonian newly drafted law restricting termination of pregnancy in country.

In October 2013 a briefing was sent to UK MEPs in support of the European Parliamentary report: 'Gendercide – the missing women?' authored by Cypriote MEP Antigoni Papadopoulou and in November 2013 several campaign letters and briefings were circulated to all UK MEPs regarding the European Parliament Estrela Report on SRHR, which represented a balanced approach to all dimensions of the right to SRHR of women and men. A letter was also sent to William Hague MP, SS for Foreign Affairs requesting his support.

The Estrela report unfortunately received an alternative resolution that was voted prior to the actual Report, which was adopted by 334:327 votes, thus replaced the Estrela Report as the European Parliament's approach to SRHR.

Collaborative press activities also continue. Several operational editorials and press releases were disseminated by Baroness Jenny Tonge as the Chair of the UK Group and President of EPF, which achieved numerous press coverage (please see Press section for further information).

Relevant UK parliamentary questions and activities have also been shared with EPF for inclusion in their newsletter and to share with other European APPGs. For example the written Parliamentary questions tabled in connection with the April 2014 commission on population and development as follows:

Asked by Baroness Tonge: To ask Her Majesty's Government (HMG) whether their delegation at the UN CPD in New York in April will raise the case for (1) a full package of sexual and reproductive health rights, and (2) an expanded ICPD PoA, to be included in the post-2015 development agenda

Baroness Northover: The UK welcomes the anniversary of the landmark ICPD in 1994, and the UN CPD in April as part of this, as a time to celebrate the significant achievements of implementation of the ICPD PoA. However, we recognise that it is also an important moment to reflect upon the gaps in implementation of the programme of action and emerging issues, as highlighted by the recent Global Review report, which need to be reflected in ongoing discussions on the post-2015 development framework.

Asked by Baroness Tonge: To ask Her Majesty's Government which Government officials will attend the April session of the UN CPD in New York.

To ask Her Majesty's Government whether they plan to include parliamentarians from the APPG on PD&RH or expert non-governmental organisations in the delegation attending the April session of the UN CPD.

Baroness Northover: Officials from the AIDS and Reproductive Health team in the DFID will attend the 47th CPD. We welcome close cooperation with civil society and are exploring the possibility of including a non-governmental representative as part of the UK delegation.

EPF conference for European APPG Secretariats, 5th – 6th December 2013, Budapest, Hungary.

The Group's advisor attended the annual parliamentary secretariat retreat organised by EPF in Budapest, Hungary, 5th – 6th December. The objective of the gathering was to reflect on the year's activities and to look ahead to population and development advocacy in Europe for the coming year.

Participants discussed common challenges and new ideas for infusing parliamentary advocacy with increased strategic focus with the aim of greater impact. One of the principal challenges discussed was the emergence of an increasingly organised anti-choice movement in Europe. Also high on the agenda was the regional and global advocacy around population issues in the run-up to the post-2015 MDG Framework and the 20-year review of the ICPD PoA by the UN General Assembly.

IPPF European Network conference on ICPD Beyond 2014 – From promises to Action, CSOs Defining the Way forward, 2nd- 4th July 2013, Geneva, Switzerland

The Group's advisor attended the above conference, where IPPF European Network was tasked as the convener of Civil Society in the region to provide space for dialogue and action following the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe Regional Conference that took place in Geneva immediately prior to the above conference, to review the status of implementation of the ICPD PoA.

The meeting provided space for dialogue and action for the civil society on how to advance the ICPD PoA and related issues in the region following the review, and defined strategies to address these challenges and priorities in the upcoming global discussions, such as the ICPD Beyond 2014 and post 2015 MDG negotiations.

The meeting saw 70 participants from NGOs including those working on human rights, HIV/AIDS, sex workers, youth issues and SRHR. These included national and regional level organisations to broaden the level of support and harness advocacy power within the region.

The meeting worked towards ensuring that the outcomes of the United Nations Economic Commission for Europe Conference be translated into action and progress for the region and that pressure maintained at a national, regional and global level, so that the voice of the region would be heard.

EuroNGOs workshop on the UN Commission on Population and Development, 23rd October 2013, Berlin, Germany

The Group's advisor attended the Deutsche Stiftung Weltbevoelkerung (DSW) and Rutgers World Population Foundation (WPF) EuroNGOs workshop on the UN Commission on Population and Development (CPD) 2014 for civil society organisations.

The meeting created a space for 76 EuroNGOs members and partners from 27 countries around the world, representing 53 SRHR advocacy organisations, to forge a strong civil society voice at CPD47. More specifically, it was an opportunity to exchange and analyse information on the ICPD Operational Review, the format, dynamics and relevance of CPD47, and European Union (EU) specific dynamics on ICPD related issues and negotiation process; to build and strengthen skills through an interactive 'simulation' session of a UN negotiation at CPD, focusing in particular on SRHR language issues; to discuss the building blocks of a coordinated civil society organisations advocacy strategy for CPD 2014, looking at eight key areas.

EuroNGOs AGM: ICPD 2014 and CPD, 24th October 2013, Berlin, Germany The Group's advisor attended the EuroNGOs AGM which remains an excellent platform for sharing experiences, networking and obtaining information on new SRHR campaigns and advocacy activities in Europe, as well as further afield.

This year's conference was titled 'ICPD 2014 and CPD', and brought together representatives from 75 of the world's leading SRHR organisations. The conference was firmly fixed on advancing SRHR in the post-2015 MDG agenda.

Almost a month after the 68th UN General Assembly's MDG Special Event, where member states came together to agree on a roadmap for a post-2015 agenda, the conference titled, "Next Steps: SRHR on the Post-2015 Agenda", called for a forward-looking development framework that would promote SRHR, gender equality, and the empowerment of women, adolescents, and youth.

The conference drew a host of international speakers including Dr Babatunde Osotimehin, Executive Director of UNFPA, and representatives from major European donor countries such as Lambert Grijns, Ambassador for SRHR and HIV & AIDS of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, The Netherlands, and Carsten Staur, Ambassador, Permanent Mission of Denmark to the UN in Geneva.

All speakers emphasised the need for a clear way forward and recognised the fulfilment of SRHR as key towards achieving gender equality and the empowerment of women and girls living in the world's poorest countries.

As a follow up to the EuroNGO AGM Baroness Tonge tabled below written Parliamentary questions:

Asked by **Baroness Tonge:** To ask HMG what steps they intend to take to ensure that the UN CPD will inform the new millennium development framework.

To ask HMG who will represent them at the 2014 Session of the UN CPD.

To ask HMG whether the 2014 Session of the UN CPD result in a negotiated outcome document; and, if so, what are their priority areas to be included in such a document

To ask HMG whether they intend to invite parliamentarians to join the UK delegation to the UN CPD in 2014.

Baroness Northover: The UK Government regards the twentieth anniversary of the landmark Cairo Consensus in 1994 as an opportunity to progress the ICPD PoA.

The UK will work hard to ensure that sexual and reproductive health and rights are reflected in the post-2015 development agenda, and has called for a standalone post-2015 goal on girls and women, and ICPD+20 is an important milestone in this regard. We therefore consider a progressive outcome, reflecting new evidence and developments in sexual and reproductive health and rights, to be the priority from the ICPD+20 process. We will be working closely with both Government and civil society partners to achieve this aim.

A decision on whether there will be a negotiated outcome is yet to be taken by the Bureau of the CPD. The composition of the UK delegation will be agreed, with DFID as the leading Department, following this decision.

Study Tour

Myanmar study tour, 17th - 25th July 2013

From 17th - 25th July 2013 the Group organised a study tour to Myanmar for a cross party UK delegation which included Meg Munn MP, John Mann MP, Heather Wheeler MP, Craig Whittaker MP and Baroness Jenkin.

The study tour was hosted by MSI with the aim of introducing UK Members of Parliament to SRHR/FP and International Development in the context of a fragile state. The study tour was intended to deepen understanding of core issues, strengthening MPs' knowledge and enhancing the membership of the UK APPG on PDRH.

Parliamentarians were briefed by representatives from the UK Embassy and DFID in Myanmar; the Deputy Minister of Health and officials, Myanmar Health Committee members, Government Hospital Directors and staff; health post workers; UN and NGO representatives, UNFPA, UN Office of Project Services (UNOPS), MSI, Myanmar Maternal and Child Welfare Association – IPPF affiliate, representatives from the Myanmar Nurse and Midwifery Association; community leaders and volunteers; sex workers and trainers, public and private physicians as well as clients and Myanmar populations and communities in and around Yangon, Mandalay, Nay Pyi Taw and Bagan.

The UK MP delegation visited the Government's largest women's hospital in Yangon in addition to government urban and rural hospitals and health centres, MSI semi-urban clinics, Myanmar Maternal and Child Welfare Association central and semi-rural maternity homes, Myanmar Nurse and Midwifery Association head-office and primary health centres and practices.

MPs were exposed to an array of FP and maternal health care services, including ante-natal, intra-partum and post-partum care, un-safe abortion and its consequences, emergency obstetric care, reproductive cancers, gender based violence, HIV/AIDS and minority groups' needs, as well as health system strengthening together with broader International Development issues.

Additional topics included DFID's Official Development Assistance priorities and initiatives undertaken in a fragile state to reduce maternal mortality and morbidity.

Also covered were the political, economic, cultural and social challenges facing Myanmar as the country works towards strengthening its health system.

Participants felt that the study tour was informative, educational and successful, stimulating plans to engage in SRHR/FP Parliamentary Advocacy to further the ICPD PoA and the MDGs.

Various meetings and activities followed the study tour, including a meeting between Lord Darzi, Baroness Jenny Tonge, MSI and members of the Myanmar Health Select Committee in September 2013 in London. Lord Darzi had been introducing the Myanmar Health Select Committee delegation to the UK tertiary NHS hospital care and agreed to host this meeting to discuss UK primary maternal health care.

In December 2013 the Group hosted a debriefing meeting between the UK MP study tour delegation, APPG Burma and other interested stakeholders (please see Group parliamentary briefing meeting section for further information).

Numerous written Parliamentary questions were tabled in both Houses following the study tour as follows:

John Mann MP: To ask the SS for ID if she will promote the rational use of antibiotics in obstetrics in Burma's health system.

Mr Duncan: DFID programmes, including in Burma, follow international guidelines for antibiotic use. Guidelines for antibiotic use in maternal health services follow international best practice. Meg Munn MP: To ask the Secretary of State for International Development what support she is providing to Burma to ensure that family planning and reproductive health services are being offered to all communities.

Mr Duncan: The UK supports the Three MDG Trust Fund in Burma and has allocated £80 million over four financial years (2012 to 2016) in support of the fund. 70% of this is allocated to support access to essential health services for maternal and child health as well as sexual and reproductive health rights and family planning. The fund operates across the whole country, with a particular focus on seven vulnerable states and divisions.

Meg Munn MP: To ask the SS for ID what support she is providing to Burma to develop its health system.

Mr Duncan: The UK supports the Three MDG Fund—the major health trust fund in Burma. So far the UK has allocated £80 million over four financial years (2012 to 2016) in support of the fund. One of its objectives is to help the Burmese Ministry of Health provide more equitable, affordable and quality health services to the most vulnerable populations within Burma.

John Mann MP: To ask the SD for ID if she will take steps to ensure the dissemination and training of health personnel in essential medicine treatment guidelines and supervision in projects supported by her Department.

Mr Duncan: The WHO advises national governments on essential drug lists in the countries in which DFID works. In addition it provides support for the development of guidelines on the use of essential medicines and generic drugs. DFID emphasises the importance of the appropriate use of medicines, and management of prescribing practice in its policy dialogue with Ministries of Health.

Heather Wheeler MP: To ask the SS for ID (1) what proportion of her Department's Burma budget will be allocated to (a) sexual and reproductive health and rights and (b) family planning services; (2) how she plans to support the Burmese Government in its future provision of (a) family planning, (b) SRHR, (c) maternal health and (d) other health services in that country.

Mr Duncan: On current projections, we estimate that nearly a quarter of the bilateral allocation for DFID's work in Burma between 2011 and 2015 will support access to essential health services for maternal and child health, sexual and reproductive health and rights, and family planning. This is based on our work through the 3 millennium development goal (3MDG) fund, to which the UK has allocated up to £80 million. The 3MDG fund also supports the national response to TB and malaria in Burma and works to strengthen important systems for the delivery of health services. The UK also supports a regional project to help prevent maternal death from unwanted pregnancy, which is active in 14 countries, including Burma.

Craig Whittaker MP: To ask the SS for ID what the principal anticipated health implications are of the findings of Burma's new census.

Mr Duncan: Improved census data and its analysis can help support more effective financing, planning, human resourcing, and infrastructure for social sectors, such as the health sector. It will enable accurate calculation of important indicators, such as maternal mortality. This information can help more effective planning of aid programmes.

Craig Whittaker MP: To ask the SS for ID what plans her Department has to make the contribution of UKAid more visible in Burma.

Mr Duncan: We ensure that all implementing partners are aware of our requirements to use the UKaid logo on programme communications, including letters, documents, websites, project signs, and at workshops. We will continue to issue press releases on high level visits and when launching major programmes, and to use the British embassy's internet communications channels to highlight our work.

Craig Whittaker MP: To ask the SS for ID how her Department measures the effectiveness of UK ODA for health in Burma.

Mr Duncan: All DFID projects are formally reviewed each year and on completion. Our funding for 3MDG, the main multi-donor trust fund for health in Burma, includes an independent evaluation of effectiveness UK development programmes are also independently scrutinised by the Independent Commission for Aid Impact (ICAI). ICAI recently gave DFID's health programmes in Burma an overall green (positive) rating.

Craig Whittaker MP: To ask the SS for ID what policy objectives her Department aims to achieve by supporting Myanmar's forthcoming census.

Mr Duncan: A census is an essential tool that enables effective government. DFID judges it sensible to support Burma's census including to advise on the content of the questions. This will help ensure it provides the most accurate and useful data possible to inform development policy.

Baroness Jenkin: To ask HMG whether the government of Burma agreed to support the United Kingdom initiative on sexual violence in conflict when requested to do so by Hugo Swire, the United

Kingdom Minister of State with responsibility for Burma, during his visit to that country in December 2012.

Baroness Warsi: During his visit in December 2012 to Burma, the Minister of State for Foreign and Commonwealth Affairs, my right hon. Friend the Member for East Devon (Mr Swire), called for action to tackle sexual violence. President Thein Sein welcomed the Preventing Sexual Violence Initiative (PSVI) during his visit to London in July. Mr Swire pressed the Burmese Foreign Minister for his government to endorse the PSVI Declaration at the UN General Assembly in September. We will continue lobbying to strengthen accountability systems and eliminate impunity for rape in Burma.

At its outset, the Initiative identified countries, in consultation with the UN and other partners, for initial deployments. Over recent months the Initiative has extended to a number of other countries—including Burma. Our Embassy in Rangoon is looking to incorporate PSVI activities in to new and existing work—for example, funding a new project to improve access to justice for victims, develop community-based preventive mechanisms and promote wider legal and policy reforms.

Baroness Jenkin: To ask HMG what steps they will take to encourage Burma's involvement in Family Planning 2020.

Baroness Northover: The UK Government will continue to support Burma's efforts in engaging with Family Planning 2020, including though dialogue with the relevant ministry.

Baroness Jenkin: To ask HMG whether they intend to take steps to assist Burma in improving the quality of its maternity services.

Baroness Northover: The UK has allocated £80 million over four financial years (2012 to 2016) in support of the Three Millennium Development Goal Trust Fund in Burma. This fund supports access to essential health services for maternal and child health and family planning.

The study tour report was submitted as written evidence to the DFID Select Committee inquiry into Myanmar in September 2013.

Abortion Statistics, 16th April 2013

Fiona Bruce MP brought forward a Bill that would mandate the Secretary of State for Health to compile statistics on gender ratios of foetuses aborted in the UK. She argued that female gendercide is taking place in the UK and that the Department of Health must be proactive in preventing, challenging and reporting female gendercide.

The proposed Bill did not receive a second reading and was withdrawn.

International Development (Gender Equality) Bill, 17th January 2014

William Cash MP brought forward, for its third reading, a Bill that would commit DFID to examine how future programmes affect women and address gender inequality. He stated that the Bill would put women's rights at the core of the international development agenda.

The Bill became an Act of Parliament (Law) on 13th March 2014 and contains the following amendments to The International Development Act 2002:

- 'Before providing development assistance under subsection (1), the Secretary of State shall have regard to the desirability of providing development assistance that is likely to contribute to reducing poverty in a way which is likely to contribute to reducing inequality between persons of different gender.'
- 'Before providing assistance under subsection (1), the Secretary of State shall have regard to the desirability of providing assistance under that subsection in a way that

takes account of any gender-related differences in the needs of those affected by the disaster or emergency.'

And to the International Development (Reporting and Transparency) Act 2006 (annual report on effectiveness of aid):

 'after paragraph (c) insert – what steps have been taken as a result of sections 1(1A) and 3(2) of the International Development Act 2002 in pursuing Millennium Development Goal 3.'

Mitochondrial Disease, 25th June 2013

Chi Onwurah MP led a Westminster Hall debate on mitochondrial diseases. He argued that secondary legislation should be introduced to allow use of mitochondria transfer techniques so that women have children who are not at risk of mitochondrial diseases.

Marriage (same sex couples) – second reading, 3rd/4th June 2013

Baroness Stowell of Beeston and Baroness Noakes led the second reading of the Bill, which would make marriage of same-sex couples lawful in England and Wales.

The Bill became an Act of Parliament (Law) on 17th July 2014. The Act makes 'provision for the marriage of same sex couples in England and Wales, about gender change by married persons and civil partners, about consular functions in relation to marriage, for the marriage of armed forces personnel overseas, for permitting

marriages according to the usages of belief organisations to be solemnized on the authority of certificates of a superintendent registrar, for the review of civil partnership, for the review of survivor benefits under occupational pension schemes, and for connected purposes.'

Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Bill – committee stage, day 1, 12th November 2013

Baroness Hamwee moved an amendment to Clause 107 (Offence of breaching forced marriage protection order). She suggested that being 'aware' of a forced marriage protection order was ambiguous and should be removed, and asked for clarification on how different courses of enforcement will be selected. Baroness Thornton also moved an amendment to Clause 107. She proposed that the Secretary of State should publish guidance on the consequences of forced marriage and breaching a forced marriage protection order.

Both amendments were withdrawn.

Baroness Scotland of Asthal moved an amendment to Clause 108 (Offence of forced marriage: England and Wales). She questioned the criminalisation of forced marriage and instead proposed that it be considered as an aggregating factor. Baroness Hamwee also moved an amendment to Clause 108. She suggested that psychological means of coercion be explicitly included in the Bill. Baroness Thornton moved an amendment to Clause 108. She proposed that the capacity of vulnerable adults to consent to marriage be considered. Baroness Berridge moved an amendment to Clause 108. She proposed altering the definition of marriage to include non-legally binding marriages.

All amendments were withdrawn.

Baroness Tonge and Lord Rea also moved an amendment to Clause 108. They proposed that, in order to tackle child marriage, the minimum age for marriage in UK be increased to 18 in line with UN recommendations.

The amendment was withdrawn.

DFID Meeting

The Group contacted Justine Greening MP, SS for ID in February 2014 requesting a meeting with her and her team to discuss:

- Her vision for FP/SRHR
- Funding to FP/SRHR
- FP2020 progress
- FP/SRHR within the Post 2015 MDG Framework
- Support from the Group to DFID
- FGH/Child Marriage conference 2014

Due to ministers travel schedules the meeting was re-scheduled twice, but finally took place on 10th July 2014, so will reported on in next year's annual report.

UK Government Correspondence

The majority of this year's correspondence with Ministers related to the preparatory meetings and the development of the new post-2015 MDG Framework and to clarify the UK Government's position on abortion services in war zones to women and girls following rape.

Letters highlighted the importance of the inclusion of a target on universal access to FP/SRHR services and a goal on gender equality within the new MDG Framework and the UK Government's support to rape victims in war zones.

Letters were sent to David Cameron MP, the Prime Minister, Justine Greening MP, SS for ID as well as Michael Anderson and David Hallam, senior advisors to David Cameron in May 2013 after the G8 Parliamentary Conference. Letters were also sent in June 2013 prior to the Open Working Group on Health and Population Dynamics, and in July - and September 2013 in response to the Secretary General's reports on the post 2015 Development Agenda, and finally in February 2014 in the lead up to the CPD and its Index report.

All letters sent, received replies from Ministers and civil servants reiterating the UK Government's support for a gender goal and a target on universal access to SRHR services within the new MDG Framework and the UK Government's lead on the change for reproductive choice, rights and women's empowerment.

The Group also sent letters to William Hague MP, SS for FCO in June 2013 with the inclusion of the UK SRHR Network briefing on integration of health services within his Preventing Sexual Violence Initiative.

Another letter was sent in July 2013 on the Security Council Resolution and women raped in war zones, reiterating the importance of member states and donors providing comprehensive and non-discriminatory medical care in accordance with international humanitarian law to girls and women.

Throughout the year the UK Government has been under pressure to state its position on abortion services in war zones, as the US continued its abortion ban on humanitarian aid for war victims.

In June 2014 DFID circulated an official letter clarifying the UK Governments position on abortion services in war zones after rape as follows:

"As you are probably aware the UK Government has put women and girls at the heart of its international development work. Preventing and responding to violence against women and girls and improving their sexual and reproductive health and rights is fundamental to this approach. On access to abortion services, UK policy is clear: Where abortion is permitted, we can consider support for activities to improve the quality, safety and accessibility of abortion services. The UK remains one of only a handful of international donors willing to tackle this highly sensitive issue.

In the autumn of 2013 UN Security Council Resolution 2122^{III} noted the need for improved access to comprehensive sexual and reproductive health services. The UK welcomes the Security Council's focus on improving access to sexual and reproductive health (SRH) in armed conflict and post—conflict settings. In light of UNSCR 2122 we have reviewed the UK policy position on safe and unsafe abortion and clarified within it our view of abortion and international humanitarian law principles:

Where abortion is permitted, UK aid can be used for activities to improve the quality, safety and accessibility of abortion services. In situations of armed conflict or occupation where denial of abortion would threaten the woman's or girl's life or cause unbearable suffering, international humanitarian law principles may justify offering an abortion rather than perpetuating what amounts to inhuman or degrading treatment. Clearly this will depend on the woman's choice, her condition and the safety and security of the humanitarian staff, as well as other contextual factors.

In humanitarian situations the UK funds partners to deliver SRH services and encourages other donors and partner agencies to provide more SRH services including the Minimum Initial Service Package.

These may include access to safe abortion services in line with our policy paper on safe and unsafe abortion. Please note UK development assistance cannot be used to procure illegal services.

We are of course aware of the many challenges to provision of comprehensive safe abortion services, particularly in complex humanitarian and conflict situations where local laws, policies or norms are restrictive. However, we urge all partners to consider how, through existing and future programmes access to sexual and reproductive health and rights can be improved for women and girls living in these situations.

UK Government and Select Committee Publications

DFID's Framework for Results for Reproductive, Maternal and Newborn Health mid-term review, December 2013

In December 2010, the UK government published its Framework for Results setting out its commitment to accelerate progress on addressing the international challenges of Reproductive Maternal and Newborn Health (RMNH). The Frameworks reflected a shift in UK development policy under the Coalition Government elected in May 2010 to a greater focus on results, seeking to direct DFID and other resources to support interventions that have strong international evidence of their effectiveness. The RMNH Framework aimed to save the lives of at least 50,000 women during pregnancy and childbirth and 250,000 newborns by 2015, through (1) empowering women and girls to make reproductive choices; (2) removing barriers that prevent access to services, particularly for the poorest and most at risk; (3) expanding the supply of quality services; and (4) enhancing accountability for results at all levels.

It builds on DFID's earlier strategies to address maternal deaths and promote SRHR.

In August 2013, Robert Morris contacted the Group. As part of a team led by Oxford Policy Management, he was selected by DFID to undertake an independent mid-term review (and later a final evaluation) of the UK Framework for Results for RMNH.

He requested a telephone interview with the Group advisor as a key informant for the mid-term review. This took place on 5th September 2013.

The following questions were discussed:

- The origins and rational of the frameworks;
- Whether they rest on solid and comprehensive evidence and provide the right direction for DFID's RMNH investments;
- The influence of the frameworks on how DFID does its work;
- The evolution of DFID programming for RMNH;
- The Role of the framework in relations to these changes:
- How RMNH activities and results are tracked;
- How effective the frameworks have been overall, how they have been used and how they could be strengthened in the future.

Ending violence against women and girls: Action Plan, 11th March 2014
In November 2010, the UK government published its 'Call to End Violence against
Women and Girls'. In March 2014 its 3rd Action Plan was published which sets out the
detail of the UK Government's achievements, and where there will be a particular focus
of activity over the coming year in response to emerging challenges.

Of particular interest to the Group is its reference to the new Anti-Social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Bill, which received Royal Assent this summer and made forced marriage a criminal offence, to ensure that this unacceptable practice can be robustly prosecuted.

The action plan also makes reference to FGM awareness raising, increased funding and part-funding of a new study into the prevalence of FGM in England and Wales. The new research will be the first update since a 2007, which revealed that over 20,000 girls in the UK could be at risk of FGM each year.

Of interest is also the reference to the UN Security Council Resolutions 2106 (preventing sexual violence in armed conflict) and 2122 (women's roles in conflict prevention) setting out a framework for preventing sexual violence in conflict and post-conflict which were agreed. The UN General Assembly Declaration was endorsed by 140 nations.

INTERNATIONAL FUNDING TO FAMILY PLANNING/SEXUAL AND REPRODUCTIVE HEALTH AND RIGHTS AND HIV/AIDS

DFID has provided UNFPA with £20 million of core funding each year for the period 2010/11 to 2013/14 and plans to provide the same in 2014/15 subject to satisfactory progress on key reforms during financial year 2013-14. £100 million will be provided as non-core funding in 2014. This non-core component will be made up of 20 contributing programmes which will each undergo annual reviews to assess performance and determine future funding.

In 2013/14 DFID provided MSI with £4.3 million and IPPF with £8.6 million of funding through its Programme Partnership Arrangement grants. In addition, IPPF received £1.5 million from DFID for an AIDS and reproductive health programme. MSI currently receives non-core funding of approximately £41.5 million for 2014/15, with future non-core funding estimated at £37.5 million for 2015/16.

Continuation of DFID's Programme Partnership Arrangement funding has been provisionally agreed for 2014/15 and 2015/16.

Women and Children First UK currently receive non-core funding of £246,101 over three years from 2014 –16. Women and Children First UK have also been provisionally approved for a second grant worth £249,842 over three years from 2014 - 2017 through the Global Poverty Action Fund, pending successful completion of pre-grant assessment.


Tables 2 and 3 provide details of DFID bilateral expenditure directly targeting reproductive health and HIV/AIDS activities. However, according to DFID, the UK's direct spend on HIV should not be seen as the sum of their work. DFID is seeking to increasingly optimise linkages and integration with other sectors where greater impact and efficiency can be achieved. The UK also supports the prevention and treatment of HIV/AIDS projects and programmes at the country level, strengthening health systems in their partner countries to deliver HIV outcomes and funding research. DFID are unable to accurately disaggregate UK HIV expenditure from these wider interventions.





INTERNATIONAL CONFERENCES

Group members and staff have attended several national and international conferences this year, as follows:

ICPD Thematic Meeting: Families, Sexual and Reproductive Health over the life course, 26th – 27th April 2013, Bucharest, Romania

Baroness Flather attended above conference. It was one of three thematic meetings organised in the UNECE region in connection with the 20th anniversary of the ICPD to review and shape the global population and development agenda for the future.

The meeting brought together experts on population dynamics, reproductive health, migration, human rights, gender equality, social and economic policies and other relevant areas. The discussions at the thematic meetings helped to create a picture of how far UNECE countries had come since the ICPD in Cairo, and where to go next to ensure health, rights and choice for women, men, old and young in the region.

UK G8 Global Parliamentary Conference: 'What place for Family Planning in the future of development', 9th – 10th May 2013, HoC, London, UK



The Group in collaboration with EPF organised the 2013 G8 Parliamentary Conference in the UK Parliament on 9^{th} – 10^{th} May 2013. This G8 Global Parliamentary conference was the latest in a succession of similar G8/G20 meetings that EPF and its APPGs have organised focusing on SRHR.

Previous conferences took place under the G8 presidencies of the UK (2005), Russia (2006), Germany (2007), Japan (2008), Italy (2009), Canada (2010) and France (2011).

Global Parliamentarians' Conferences are held annually to enable dialogue between decision-makers interested in human rights and development issues from G8 and G20 countries and their counterparts from elsewhere in Africa, the Americas, Asia and Europe.

Two planning meetings were held in London in October 2012 and February 2013.

It was agreed that the two day conference should address the greatest challenges facing the international development community at present: the lack of access to

modern methods of FP facing 222 million women around the world. The goal was to find a solution for this challenge, by examining how FP can be encompassed in the new guiding framework for international development.

57 parliamentarians from 34 countries from around the world (including 14 G20 countries) met at the conference in the Houses of Parliament in London, where they were joined by over 100 other participants from across the fields of international development. As planned, discussions were on the importance of FP and SRHR in development, and how they are key to issues such as sustainable development, women's empowerment and maternal and newborn health.

At the end of the event parliamentarians agreed upon a powerful message to the policymakers who are planning the future framework for International Development.

This message outlined their understanding that: "Women's and adolescent's SRHR affect not only their own wellbeing and destinies; they also direct the future of families, societies and humanity and are a key driver of social and economic development. It then went on to: "Demand that G8/G20 leaders place FP in the context of SRHR at the core of the post-2015 development agenda."

Key note speakers included: Lynne Featherstone MP, PUSS for ID; Professor Hans Rosling, Professor of International Health, Karolinska Institute, Sweden; Dr Toshiko Abe MP, Parliamentary vice-Minister for Foreign Affairs, Japan; Marie Rose Nguini Effa MP, Chair of the Health, Labour and Social Affairs Committee of the Pan African Parliament, member of the National Assembly of Cameroon; Andrew Mitchell MP, Former SS for ID, UK and Dianne Stewart, Director, External Relations Division, UNFPA.

The event featured prominently in the media, with BBC Radio 4's Woman's Hour interviewing delegates including Baroness Jenny Tonge and Dr Hedy Fry MP, Canada, chair of the drafting committee on the issues. Several reports were published on the Guardian Global Development Blog (please see Press section for further information).

The conference was followed by a reception in the House of the Speaker of the House of Commons John Bercow MP.

Following the conference organisations vowed to follow up with the parliamentarians present to ensure that they put pressure on their heads of government to ensure that the conference declaration's message be heard by those designing the future of the international development agenda.

The Group sent a covering letter with the final declaration to all relevant UK cabinet members and civil servants and Group members.

Baroness Jenny Tonge referenced the Conference in her 21st May oral Parliamentary question as follows:

Baroness Tonge: To ask HMG what are their priorities for the G8 meeting on 17th June.

Baroness Warsi: My Lords, the priorities for the G8 are pushing for practical action to achieve fairer taxes, greater transparency and freer trade. Those are actions that are essential in shaping the rules

characterising a fair and open global economy, and ensure that both developed and developing countries benefit. G8 leaders will discuss topical foreign policy and global economic issues, as well as terrorism and security in weak and ungoverned spaces, especially the Sahel and north-west Africa.

Baroness Tonge: My Lords, is the Minister aware that at the pre-G8 parliamentarians conference held at Westminster last week, to which more than 100 parliamentarians from all over the world came, it was once again affirmed that voluntary family planning and maternal health are cost-effective ways of promoting economic development by stabilising population growth and enabling women to access education and join the workforce? Will our Government, therefore, press their commitment to family planning and maternal health at the G8 meeting?

Baroness Warsi: I cannot assure my noble friend whether that will be on the agenda, but I will certainly take her views back. She will be aware that a huge amount of work is done by the Foreign Office and the Department for International Development both in projects on the ground and in creating the right climate for these matters to be discussed. Sometimes G8 summits are seen as places where western nations can point the finger at developing countries, but this meeting is also about the G8 countries getting their house in order.

Women Deliver Conference, 25th – 29th May 2013, Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia Baroness Jenny Tonge attended the Women Deliver Conference in Kuala Lumpur on 25th – 29th May 2013.

The conference saw 4,500 participants representing over 2,200 organisations and 149 countries in total. 52 parliamentarians attended in total from regional parliamentary networks.

A Parliamentarians' Forum was organised as a side event to the conference on "Successes, challenges and obstacles in advancing women's and girls' health and rights". The event was dedicated to discussing what parliamentarians can do to "deliver for women" and to draft a "Global legislative agenda to deliver for women".

Baroness Jenny Tonge spoke at the event. Participating MPs recalled that reproductive health care is critical to the health and rights of women and girls, who are themselves essential for prosperity and opportunity everywhere.

Family Planning Conference, 11th – 15th November 2013, Addis Ababa, Ethiopia Baroness Jenny Tonge attended the third International Conference on FP in Addis Ababa on behalf of Group and as President of the EPF.

This conference saw more than 3,300 delegates from 120 countries, and ended with a Call to Action seeking to keep focus on FP and SRHR as part of the post-2015 development framework

As the President of the EPF and in collaboration with the Asian Forum for Parliamentary on Population and Development, Baroness Jenny Tonge spoke at the panel of parliamentarians with the title: 'Generating political will to promote FP and bring about demographic dividend'.

DFID Conflict, Humanitarian and Security Department (CHASE) conference, 13th November 2013, London, UK

Leading humanitarian agencies met at the UK and Swedish CHASE conference in London to endorse a global commitment to prioritise the protection of girls and women from violence and sexual exploitation in emergency situations.

The one day conference was attended by Senior Ministers, Governments, UN heads, international NGOs and civil society organisations as well as MPs including Group members.

A communique was agreed at the conference for early action to protect girls and women in emergencies which will be monitored and reported on.

At the event DFID announced £21.6 million new funding to protect girls and women in emergencies, namely:

- £3 million to support UNFPA work to protect girls and women in Syria;
- £4 million and £1.6 million for projects in Lebanon and Jordon, respectively;
- £1 million for a Norwegian Refugee Council (NRC) project in Jordan £3 million* for International Committee of the Red Cross;
- £9 million for DFID programmes with the International Rescue Committee (IRC) in Pakistan, Democratic Republic of Congo; and
- Other funding commitments totalling £19.7 million were also made by the USA, Switzerland, Japan and Humanitarian Aid and Civil Protection (ECHO).

CPA UK conference for parliamentarians on the Post 2015 development agenda, 26th – 28th November, HoC, London, UK

Members attended part of the CPA three-day conference, which brought together an audience of over 80 international parliamentarians and high profile experts from international and NGOs, civil society groups and academia from Commonwealth and non-Commonwealth countries to discuss the future of global development indicators.

A conference communiqué, highlighting priority issues for parliamentarians and was drafted by a working group. In addition, an action plan for parliamentarians was drawn up to assist delegates with influencing, implementing and monitoring the post-2015 development agenda.

Africa Regional Forum for Parliamentarians on Population and Development, 17th – 19th March 2014, Abidjan, Cote D'Ivoire



Baroness Jenny Tonge attended the three-day parliament meeting in Abidjan, Cote d'Ivoire.

She was invited to present "the lessons learned from parliamentary advocacy in the UK and Europe" and to give a regional perspective of the challenges that parliamentarians collectively face in parliamentary advocacy.

The meeting was organised in collaboration with UNFPA and IPPF with the overall objective of re-establishing the African Forum on Population and Development and increase the number of African champions able to promote dialogue and cooperation among parliamentarians, to further the implementation of the ICPD PoA in African countries. During the meeting African parliamentarians pledged to eliminate preventable maternal mortality, by ensuring universal access to FP, and management of preventable complications arising from unsafe abortion.

In the declaration they pledged to "use the Common African Position (CAP) on the Post 2015 Development Agenda" to speak with one voice and to act in unity to ensure that Africa's voice is heard and is fully integrated into the global development agenda.

UNFPA and IPPF Africa Region agreed at the meeting to support the African parliamentarian's secretariat.

HEARINGS

Child Marriage, "A Childhood Lost", 2012

The Group has been following up on its child marriage hearing report: "A Childhood Lost', since its launch in November 2012.

During the summer of 2013 the report was circulated to religious leaders in the UK, which generated numerous responses, including letters thanking the Group for highlighting this hidden child abuse and a request for Baroness Jenny Tonge to speak at events.

A reader at the Roehampton University requested information in connection with a report she was writing for the EU on forced marriage in the UK (please see Communications section for further information).

In the Scottish Parliament in June 2013 Hanzala Malik a Glasgow MP tabled a motion on forced marriage making reference to the Group's report.

In February 2014 Baroness Jenny Tonge presented the Hearing report and its findings in the Norwegian Parliament (please see APPG section for further information).

Child marriage has also been highlighted via Parliamentary questions and debates in both Houses – examples follow:

Asked by Baroness Tonge: To ask HMG whether they will consider raising the legal age of marriage in England and Wales from 16 to 18, in line with the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, which defines those under the age of 18 as children.

Lord McNally: The Government does not consider that it is necessary to amend the age at which people can enter into marriage. No person under the age of 16 can marry in England and Wales and any marriage under that age will be void. In England and Wales it is possible to marry from the age of 16 with parental consent and from 18 without consent. The Government believes the existing provisions that require parental consent for people under the age of 18 to marry provide adequate protection for people entering into marriage.

HoC January Westminster Hall debate on violence against women:

Sandra Osborne MP said: "...Former UN Secretary-General Kofi Annan has described violence against women and girls as one of the most pervasive human rights violations in the world. It is both endemic and epidemic. It limits self-esteem, life chances, economic opportunity and development. Gender-based violence reinforces women's inequality....Today I want to highlight two tragedies connected to the plight

of women. The first is forced and child marriage, which is practiced in too many parts of the world, including the UK. Those affected may become vulnerable to sexual abuse and exploitation, early pregnancy, with a high risk of maternal mortality and morbidity, and the transmission of sexually transmitted infections and HIV. Teen pregnancy is the No. 1 cause of mortality for girls between the ages of 15 and 19 and nearly 10% of all adolescent girls in low and middle-income countries are mothers before they are 16. Taking action against early and forced marriage will ensure that more young women and girls can continue their education, act with agency and make independent decisions about their futures. I commend the work that DFID is doing and the references to the subject in the Select Committee report, but the all-party group on population, development and reproductive health, of which I am a member, has also produced a report. "A Childhood Lost", about child marriages in the UK and abroad, was published a year ago. The report says that it is estimated that every year 5,000 to 8,000 people, including many young girls, are at risk of forced marriage in England. The chair of the all-party group has tabled amendments to the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Bill, which is currently being debated in the other House, to safeguard 16 and 17-year-olds in the UK, who are currently able to marry with parental consent. I want to repeat the comments made in the Select Committee report, about FGM in the UK, with reference to this topic: while it is beyond my remit to comment on domestic policy in this debate, I believe "that—as it stands—the UK's credibility in calling to end the practice overseas is undermined by the failure to tackle the problem at home." I shall follow the debate in the other House with interest and I hope the Government will agree to safeguard young girls. That will send a strong message to practising communities at home and abroad..."

Most importantly however was Baroness Jenny Tonge's amendments to this year's Government Bill on Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing. Amendments were introduced as follows to increase UK marriage age from 16 to 18:

Initial amendment tabled in November 2013:

Page 79, line 9, at end insert -

- "() A person commits an offence under the law of England and Wales if he or she -
- a) is the parent or guardian of a child and
- b) gives consent for that child to marry before the age of 18."

Page 80, line 3, at end insert -

- "() A person commits an offence under the law of Scotland if he or she -
- a) is the parent or guardian of a child and
- b) gives consent for that child to marry before the age of 18."

Subsequent amendment in January 2014:

Clause 109 BARONESS TONGE

87A* Page 80, line 23, at end insert—

- "(6A) A person commits an offence under the law of England and Wales if he or she-
- (a) is the parent or guardian of a child, and
- (b) gives consent for that child to enter into marriage before the age of 18 unless the written consent of both parties to the marriage has been obtained.
- (6B) The provisions of subsection (6A) also apply to any procedure undertaken to recognise a marriage contracted outside the United Kingdom."

Clause 110 BARONESS TONGE

87B* Page 80, line 44, at end insert—

- "(2A) A person commits an offence under the law of Scotland if he or she-
- (a) is the parent or guardian of a child, and
- (b) gives consent for that child to enter into marriage before the age of 18 unless the written consent of both parties to the marriage has been obtained.
- (2B) The provisions of subsection (2A) also apply to any procedure undertaken to recognise a marriage contracted outside the United Kingdom."

Meetings were held with Lord Ahmad the Minister in charge of the Bill and senior advisors to discuss both initial and subsequent amendments. Despite lengthy discussions surrounding marriage of 16 and 17 year olds the Government remained unsupportive of amendments - they reiterated their position that consent was covered within the Bill and would apply to all age groups including 16 and 17 year olds.

Child marriage press coverage increased during the year especially due to the Antisocial Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act and forced marriage becoming a criminal offence in the summer of 2014.

Maternal Morbidity - "Better off Dead?", 2009

The Group continue to promote the 2009 Maternal Morbidity Hearing Report: 'Better off Dead?' in parliamentary debates, press articles, and at national and international conferences.

At the HoL Bill on Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing, January (report stage) 2014

Baroness Tonge said: "... We know that marriage as early as 16 is a public health issue as well as a violation of human rights. It takes away opportunity for education and economic independence; it is associated with violence, rape and sexual abuse; it contributes to higher rates of maternal morbidity and mortality and contributes to poor child development.....".

At the HoC Westminster debate, January 2014:

Sandra Osborne MP said: "...Today I want to highlight two tragedies connected to the plight of women. The first is forced and child marriage, which is practiced in too many parts of the world, including the UK. Those affected may become vulnerable to sexual abuse and exploitation, early pregnancy, with a high risk of maternal mortality and morbidity, and the transmission of sexually transmitted infections and HIV. Teen pregnancy is the No. 1 cause of mortality for girls between the ages of 15 and 19 and nearly 10% of all adolescent girls in low and middle-income countries are mothers before they are 16..."

Return of the Population Growth Factor – Its impact upon the MDGs, 2007/2009

The Group continue to promote the 2007/2009 Hearing Report: 'Return of the Population Growth Factor and its Impact upon the MDGs' and 2009 updated summary leaflet.

At the HoC 17th July 2013 oral Parliamentary question:

Richard Ottaway MP said: What assessment she has made of likely population growth in north and west Africa by 2050; and if she will make a statement.

Lynne Featherstone MP, PUSS for ID: The UN released revised population projections on 13 June. The population in north Africa is projected to increase from 200 million in 2010 to 319 million in 2050, while in west Africa the projected rise is from 305 million in 2010 to 815 million in 2050.

Richard Ottaway MP: The region is already experiencing substantial instability and extremism, and the likely outcome is that millions of young men and women will have bleak economic prospects. Given that no country has emerged from poverty without first addressing its levels of population growth, will the Minister give the region priority in her population programmes?

Lynne Featherstone MP, PUSS for ID: My hon. Friend has made an important point. West Africa has particularly high rates of population growth, and there is much less take-up of family planning there. DFID's work involves not only family planning—which is a complex issue—but the delaying of first pregnancies, access to economic assets for girls, getting girls through secondary school and preventing violence, all of which contribute to making the population richer and more successful.

Linking Sexual and Reproductive Health and HIV/AIDS, "The Missing Link", 2004 The Groups 2004 Hearing Report: 'The Missing Link' has seen little publicity over recent years as the advantages of linking SRHR and HIV/AIDS, policies, services and programmes, are now commonly accepted.

FGM, 2000

The Group continue to promote its 2001 FGM Hearing Report. Of particular importance this year was the second DPP round table meeting on FGM in September 2013. This was a follow up meeting set up for stakeholders to report back on progress made against the first FGM DPP action plan drafted a year earlier and discuss any new issues that had arisen.

The discussions informed a second action plan, to be taken forward and overseen by Nick Hunt, Director of Strategy and Policy, Crown Prosecution Service (CPS).

At the meeting the CPS reported an increase in reporting of FGM including to the police and subsequent investigated by the CPS. One possible prosecution had surfaced after multiple work and collaboration, however a decision was made not to go ahead, as would not be in the child's best interest. Keir Starmer however did report that another prosecution was imminent.

Also important this year was Jane Ellison MP's appointment to PUSS for the Department of Health in October 2013. As the previous chair of the APPG on FGM, she immediately engaged the press and the Evening Standard ran a press campaign to engage the public on FGM. Articles were published daily.

Members continue highlighting FGM in parliamentary debates:

House of Lords 4th December debate on FGM:

Lord Patel said: "...I work with a charity that trains doctors and nurses in Africa to help women who have obstetric fistula. There are 2 million such women. FGM contributes to these women having difficulty in labour and the resulting fistulas. It also contributes to them having a higher incidence of postpartum haemorrhage and to them dying because of it. FGM, therefore, does not just cause horrific suffering: it causes death..."

Baroness Tonge: ".. I came into Parliament in 1997 with a lot of women parliamentarians, and I quickly joined the All-Party Parliamentary Group on Population Development and Reproductive Health. Of course there was the 1985 Act that prohibited FGM—everyone knows about that—but by the year 2000 that all-party group had produced a report on FGM, which is still up on the group's website. Following that report, Christine McCafferty MP, the chair of the group at the time, took a 10-minute rule Bill through Parliament to prevent FGM from being perpetrated on girls taken out of the country. It was illegal within the country but we wanted to ensure that girls could not be taken out in the school holidays. This was followed by Ann Clwyd—supported in the House of Commons, I may say, by me—introducing an amendment to the 1985 Act, and in 2003 Royal Assent was given to making FGM illegal if girls were taken out of the country to have it done. Nevertheless, it has taken 10 years to get the broader media and parliamentarians interested and, as we have heard, no prosecutions of individuals have taken place in that time, the main reason being that although, for example, 63 cases were reported between November 2009 and November 2011, no individual would give evidence. Girls stay loyal to their families. The noble Baroness, Lady Rendell, has to be congratulated; throughout this time she has campaigned on this issue and constantly drawn attention to this dreadful abuse. Some 18 months ago, my all-party group suggested that we had a meeting with the Director of Public Prosecutions—Keir Starmer, at the time—to discuss why no prosecutions were taking place. He organised a round-table meeting; Jane Ellison, the chair of the all-party group on FGM, came to it, as did many social workers, doctors, teachers and NGOs. He got together a huge collegiate group of people who were concerned about this practice. After several meetings, there is now a countrywide alert for teachers, doctors, social workers and so on to report any suspicions that they may have. I understand too that the Home Affairs Select Committee is to investigate the matter, but I contend that we have had enough reports, investigations and round-table meetings. What we need is a prosecution, and Keir Starmer assured us a few months ago that there was one in the pipeline. That is what we need. We do not want the victim to be harmed, but we need a prosecution that is well publicised in order to alert everyone in the country to this awful practice..."
